

## **The types of licensed community care facilities include:**

### **Adult Residential**

Any facility where care is provided to three or more vulnerable adults who are dependent on caregivers for continuing assistance or direction in the form of 3 or more of the following prescribed services and where the caregiver is not related by blood or marriage to the persons in care, is considered a Community Care Facility.

- Regular assistance with activities of daily living (e.g. eating, mobility, dressing, bathing)
- Storage & administration of medication or monitoring the taking of medication
- Maintenance or management of cash resources or other property of person in care
- Monitoring food intake or adherence to therapeutic diets
- Structure behaviour management and intervention
- Psychosocial or intensive physical rehabilitative therapy

Residential care includes long term care for seniors and specialized residential care for vulnerable adults. Facilities are inspected regularly to ensure compliance with the Community Care and Assisted Living Act and Adult Care Regulations to determine if minimum health and safety requirements are being followed with respect to policies, staffing, resident care, building requirements and others. In addition, follow up is done in response to complaints, allegations of abuse, and reportable incidents.

### ***Residential Care:***

Residential Facilities & Homes (generally for seniors), Specialized Residential Care Facilities & Homes (for persons living with developmental challenges or mental health or addiction issues),  
Child/Youth Residential facilities

### ***Child Care:***

Group Child Care (Under 36 Months)  
Group Child Care (30 Months to School Age)  
Preschool (30 Months to School Age),  
Group Child Care (School Age),

Family Child Care,  
Occasional Child Care,  
Multi-Age Child Care, and  
In-Home Multi-Age Child Care.
