

SAFE DISPOSAL

of needles and other sharps

Anyone who uses a needle to inject should dispose of it safely. However, sometimes discarded needles or other "sharps" (i.e. syringes, blades or glass) are found in public areas.

Safe disposal of needles and other sharps saves others from getting hurt accidentally. Fortunately, the risk of getting sick if you are pricked is very low.

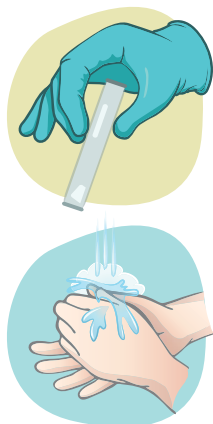
SAFE NEEDLE DISPOSAL

- Don't try to replace the cap on needles
- Don't snap, break or bend needles or other sharps
- Pick up needle with care using work gloves and tongs or tweezers
- Hold needle point away from you
- Put needle in a metal or hard plastic container with a lid (i.e. product or drink bottle)
- Replace cap on container securely and label it
- Remove gloves and wash hands thoroughly with soap and water
- Drop off the sealed container at your local health unit or at a community drop box



SAFE DISPOSAL OF SHARPS

- Pick up sharps (i.e. syringes, blades or glass pipes) using work or latex gloves.
- Place items into double plastic bags and dispose in the garbage.
- Wash hands thoroughly with soap and water.



IF YOU ARE PRICKED BY A NEEDLE

Please take the following steps:

- Allow wound to bleed freely
- Quickly wash the injured area with soap and warm water
- Do not squeeze or bleach the injured area
- Immediately call the Communicable Disease program at Island Health (8:30 AM–4:30 PM):

- Visit your local emergency department within two hours for treatment and follow-up
